

Inclusive Cities



The 6th Dialogue for Urban Change







The 6th edition of the Dialogues for Urban Change (D4UC) was hosted by the City of Ludwigsburg, Germany, from 12th – 16th September 2024. Here, the participating cities and national institutions from Germany and South Africa updated on the progress of each city's Living Lab and had the privilege of visiting Living Labs and pop-up measures implemented by the City through collegial advice they received from participating in the D4UC. These included insightful walking tours to inner city transformation areas in Ludwigsburg.

By background, South Africa and Germany have championed a learning alliance on integrated urban development and new forms of cooperation based on bilateral agreements between counterpart national ministries. Both countries have national urban policies: the Integrated Urban Development Framework (IUDF) in South Africa and the National Urban Development Policy (NSP) in Germany. The collaboration between the two countries extends to the city level by developing a peer-to-peer (P2P) learning programme involving representatives from South Africa, such as the Department of Cooperative Governance, Department of Human Settlements, National Treasury, South African Local Government Association (SALGA) and the South African Cities Network (SACN) and German representatives from the Association of German Cities (DST). The eight-city participants included KwaDukuza, Nelson Mandela Bay, Stellenbosch, and uMhlathuze in South Africa and the German cities of Bottrop, Karlsruhe, Ludwigsburg, and Nuremberg.

17th German Federal Congress on National Urban Policy

On the heels of the 6th D4UC, the Inclusive Cities programme had the privilege of representing SACN at the 17th German Federal Congress on National Urban Development Policy, hosted by the City of Heidelberg from 17-19 September. Organised by the Federal Ministry for Housing, Urban Development and Building (BMWSB) in partnership with the Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ), the congress was an opportunity for the German urban sector and its invited international partners and networks to come together and consider key issues. The international side events included a networking session among the South African, Ukrainian and American networks hosted by Germany. Key topics of consideration included Local to Global Cooperation in Urban Development in an International Context and The Power of Cities in the Transformative Reconstruction of Ukraine. A myriad of other side events and topics provided insight and learning for South African cities present.

The occasion also cemented cooperative relations between South Africa and Germany on the urban agenda, with the signing of a Statement of Intent between the South African COGTA Ministry, led by Minister Velenkosini Hlabisa, and their German principal and counterpart from the BMWSB.





Innovative Cities







Africa - US Smart Cities Lab - 14 August 2024

The South African Cities Network's Innovation Programme Manager, Rebecca Gatang'i, represented SACN at the Inaugural Africa - US Smart Cities Lab at WITS University on 14 August 2024 by participating in a Panel Discussion in which she spoke about Smart Cities in South Africa from a Local Government Perspective.

The Smart Cities Lab aimed to unpack in detail what smart cities are, the infrastructure required for sustainable smart cities, and the financing and branding of smart cities. This lab was an unmissable opportunity for anyone passionate about the future of urban living. It brought together civil society organisations, government officials, and scholars to foster a comprehensive understanding and collaborative approach to developing smart cities.



Recommendations from SACN's Presentation:

- **Engage Early with Local Authorities:** Understand regulatory requirements and seek early engagement with Council or relevant authority body PPP MFMA (Act 56 of 2003)
- Focus on Capacity Building: Invest in training and developing local technical expertise.
- Promote Inclusivity: Ensure that smart city solutions are accessible to all segments of the population.
- **Build Partnerships:** Collaborate with local businesses/Business Chambers, academic institutions, and community organisations.
- Secure Sustainable Funding: Explore innovative financing models and public-private partnerships.
- Adapt to Local Context: Customise solutions to fit the unique needs and conditions of South African municipalities.

Stakeholder Engagement concerning the empowerment of informal traders within the City of Tshwane

The South African economy continues to grapple with various challenges, including sluggish growth, rising unemployment, and persistent inequality. Amid this landscape, the role of urban economies in driving inclusive, resilient, and sustainable development has become increasingly critical. The South African Cities Network's (SACN) Productive Cities Programme remains committed to supporting cities in creating environments conducive to entrepreneurship, job creation, and economic resilience by providing the necessary research and market intelligence.

During the past quarter, SACN participated in a Stakeholder Engagement on the *Empowerment of Women in the Informal Economy Sector within the City of Tshwane.* This engagement was hosted by the Gauteng Provincial Office of the Commission for Gender Equality on 21 August 2024. The engagement centred on the empowerment of informal traders within the City of Tshwane Metropolitan Municipality, brought together critical stakeholders, and highlighted the crucial role of the policy and regulatory environment in facilitating conducive environments for small businesses to thrive and to protect the livelihoods of the most vulnerable.

During the engagement, the SACN presented research from its catalogue designed to address the barriers that hinder the development of informal and township economies. Specifically, these reports focus on national, provincial, and municipal regulatory frameworks and how they can be better aligned to create an enabling environment for informal traders and small-scale entrepreneurs. In this context, the SACN remains a crucial partner and facilitator for cities seeking to balance regulation with empowerment. Looking ahead, the Productive Cities Programme will continue providing the research and market intelligence that can guide cities toward more inclusive and sustainable economies. The SACN's commitment to building cities that are not only productive but also equitable and resilient will remain at the forefront of its efforts to contribute to South Africa's broader economic recovery.

Well-Governed Cities



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Off-Grid Cities and the Governance of the Just Urban Transition

The South African Cities Network (SACN), in partnership with the University of the Western Cape's Politics and Urban Governance (PUG) Research Group and the Gauteng City-Region Observatory (GRCO), hosted a thought-provoking online Knowledge Exchange event on Off-Grid Cities and the Governance of the Just Urban Transition on 22 July 2024.

The session looked at:

- Off-Grid Cities: Highlighting the outcomes of the NRF-funded research project examining how urban elites are seceding from state-provided infrastructure networks in favour of private hybrid and off-grid technologies and how this impacts social justice, climate change, and sustainable urban development and
- Governance of the Just Urban Transition: Gain insights from the South African Cities Network's research paper, which examines the process of shifting towards socially just and environmentally sustainable cities and how that requires realigning how cities are governed, how existing institutional systems function, and the actors instrumental in supporting this transition.

Professor Fiona Anciano (UWC's PUG Research Group) and Dr Christina Culwick-Fatti (UWC's PUG Research Group and GCRO) presented the research findings.

The session featured a panel consisting of:

- Dr Tracy Ledger, Head of the Energy Transition Programme, Public Affairs Research Institute (PARI)

City Respondents included Nomvula Mofokeng and Ondela Tywakadi of the City of Johannesburg and Daniel Sullivan from the City of Cape Town.

Spark discussions on creating cities that are environmentally sound and socially inclusive.



Explore pathways towards effective collaboration between stakeholders for a sustainable future.

The SACN developed this research paper, reflecting on the nature and dynamics of the institutional and governance shifts required for a just urban transition.


The objectives of this paper are:

- Enable municipal leaders to deal with the complexities of transitioning to inclusive, equitable, resilient, and spatially integrated cities that are de-carbonised, resource-efficient and biodiverse.
- Governance that recognises the competing interests and roles of people, power and politics.
- Identify and understand problems; iterative governance processes with stakeholders; collectively agreed objectives that meet social justice principles.





Research Paper: Boosting Citizen Engagement in Urban Governance through Storytelling



Storytelling and Urban Governance Paper was developed through engagements with our City Communicators' Reference Group, which highlights the effectiveness of storytelling in communicating complex issues to engage effectively with citizens:

Some of the stories featured include:

- City of Tshwane: Educating citizens about their rights and responsibilities through the Tshwane ya Tima revenue collection campaign.
- eThekwini Municipality communicated complex issues and information about the flood disaster in 2022 through stories.
- Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality and the City of Cape Town by mobilising citizens and fostering participatory democracy through their "Save Water" campaigns.

SACN to mark World Cities Day 2024 with the launch of Good Hood Stories Season 3!

Join us on World Cities Day as we launch Season 3 of the Good Hood Stories films.

The Good Hood Stories celebrate creative and collaborative city-making practices taking place across South African neighbourhoods. The third season of the Good Hood Stories has been created in partnership with the Department of Human Settlements and with a thematic focus on *transforming informal settlements*.

Two exceptional projects are featured, which demonstrate two important aspects of informal settlement transformation: the delivery of sanitation services and solid waste management. Project Preparations Trust's partnership with eThekwini Municipality on solid waste management and Asivikelane's gender-responsive service delivery in Knysna, Western Cape, both feature highly collaborative community-led approaches to informal settlement upgrading, which are championed through partnerships between different urban sectors.
